Over time, I’ve come to appreciate your judgment and compassion, but at the core I applaud your ability to seek the truth and support financially viable projects.

Tip: Invest in airlines that fly internationally.

We have 11 million unauthorized immigrants in this country, many of whom would like to fly home and return safely but fear the consequences.

Twenty million American home and business owners, farmers, service-providers and processing-plant owners hire roughly 8 million unauthorized immigrants, saving themselves an average of 25 percent on wages.

Unfortunately, ordinary taxpayers currently pick up the tab for immigration costs to society, which needs to change if we are to reform immigration. Immigrant Tax Inquiry Group (ITIG) has developed a model for immigration reform whereby workers and employers contribute 10 percent (jointly) of immigrant wages—just a nickel for every dollar earned. In return, and a major incentive for cooperation, is the right to travel home and return safely, thus creating an enormous demand on the airlines.

Other benefits include a 10-year renewable special work permit, access to medical care, education and specially created programs to help them assimilate. The plan generates \$210 billion over 10 years and the 1.7 million new American jobs created will go a long way toward easing tensions in the U.S.

The model has evolved over seven years of research and input from meetings with congressional staff; the result is a viable, compassionate program where taxpayers and immigrants alike will benefit.
